The Rhode Island Department of Administration, Office of Purchases, on behalf of the State of Rhode Island, Executive Office of Health and Human Services, is requesting Letters of Interest from qualified agencies to provide comprehensive community based substance abuse prevention services, in accordance with the terms of this solicitation, and the State's General Conditions of Purchase (available at www.purchasing.ri.gov).

The Department of Human Services (DHS), on behalf of the Executive Office of Health and Human Services, is seeking to fund up to 14 communities to use the Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration's Strategic Prevention framework to reduce the burden of substance abuse upon the state of RI. Funded communities will utilize the five steps of the Strategic Prevention Framework to develop a strategic plan for substance abuse prevention services within their community. Upon approval of that plan, communities will provide culturally appropriate and sustainable substance abuse prevention services as part of the Rhode Island Strategic Prevention Framework – State Incentive Grant. Substance abuse prevention task forces from the communities of **BRISTOL, CRANSTON, EAST PROVIDENCE, MIDDLETOWN, NEWPORT, NORTH KINGSTOWN, NORTH PROVIDENCE, PAWTUCKET, PROVIDENCE, SMITHFIELD, WARWICK, WESTERLY, WEST WARWICK AND WOONSOCKET** who can demonstrate their knowledge, experience and accomplishments in these areas are encouraged to submit Letters of Interest in response to this Request.

INSTRUCTIONS AND NOTIFICATIONS TO OFFERORS:

Potential offerors are advised to review all sections of this solicitation carefully, and to follow instructions completely, as failure to make a complete submission as described elsewhere herein may result in rejection of the proposal.

Proposals which depart from or materially alter the terms, requirements, or scope of work defined by this Request will be rejected as being non-responsive.

The state reserves the right to award to one or more offerors. All cost associated with developing or submitting a proposal in response to this Request, or to provide oral or written clarification of its content shall be borne by the offeror. The State assumes no responsibility for these costs.

Proposals are considered to be irrevocable for a period of not less than sixty (60) days following the opening date, and may not be withdrawn, except with the express written permission of the State Purchasing Agent.

Proposal misdirected to other State locations or which are otherwise not present in the Office of Purchases at the time of opening for any cause will be determined to be late and will not be considered. The Official time clock is located in the Reception Area of the Department of Administration / Division of Purchases.

In accordance with Title 7, Chapter 1.1 of the General Laws of Rhode Island, no foreign corporation, a corporation without a Rhode Island business address, shall have the right to transact business in the state until it shall have procured a Certificate of Authority to do so from the Rhode Island Secretary of State (401-222-3040). *This is a requirement only of the successful vendor (s).*

Bidders are advised that all materials submitted to the State of Rhode Island for consideration in response to this Letter of Interest will be considered to be public records, as defined in Title 38 Chapter 2 of the Rhode Island General Laws, without exception, and will be released for inspection immediately upon request, once an award has been made.

Interested parties are instructed to peruse the Division of Purchases web site on a regular basis, as additional information relating to this solicitation may be released in the form of an addendum to this RFP / LOI.

It is anticipated that, following the selection of the awardees under this Letter of Interest, each awardee will enter into an individual Contract of Work, executed by the awardee and the Rhode Island Department of Human Services on behalf of the Executive Office of Health and Human Services, which will include specific items or services required by the awardee.

SECTION I

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:

The Rhode Island Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant (SPF SIG) is a cooperative agreement between the Governor of the State of Rhode and the federal Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration/Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP). The RI Executive Office of Health and Human Services administers the SPF SIG on behalf of the Governor. The purpose of this cooperative agreement is to:

- Prevent the onset and reduce the progression of substance abuse, including childhood and underage drinking
- Reduce substance-abuse related problems in the communities, and
- Build prevention capacity and infrastructure at the State and community levels

As a result of a comprehensive state wide needs assessment, including the preparation a state epidemiologic profile, three priority consequences and four related consumption

patterns have been identified as significant sources of burden to the State of Rhode Island. The three priority consequence areas are alcohol related traffic fatalities, DSM IV diagnoses of alcohol dependence or abuse and DSM IV diagnoses of drug dependence or abuse. The four related consumption patterns are drinking and driving across the lifespan, use of alcohol by youth under 21 (underage drinking), use of marijuana and illicit substances by youth in grades 9 –12.

Funding will be provided to communities to reduce the following consequences: DSM-IV diagnoses of alcohol dependence or abuse and DSM IV diagnoses of drug dependence or abuse. Communities will be asked specifically to address underage drinking as a consumption pattern related to DSM-IV diagnoses of dependence or abuse and use of marijuana and illicit substances by youth ages 12-18 as a consumption pattern related to DSM-IV diagnoses of drug dependence or abuse.

SECTION II

SCOPE of WORK

Eligible communities will be funded to use the Strategic Prevention Framework in their community to address the state identified priorities of DSM-IV diagnoses of alcohol and drug dependence or abuse. Specific associated consumption patterns that communities should plan to address with SPF SIG funds include; drinking and driving, underage drinking and use of marijuana and illicit substances by youth ages 12 -18. Topic areas of services covered by this request include but are not limited to:

Step 1. Profile COMMUNITY needs, resources and readiness to address needs and gaps based upon STATE IDENTIFIED priorities.

Step 2. Mobilize and/or build COMMUNITY capacity to address STATE IDENTIFIED priorities.

Step 3. Develop a comprehensive strategic plan to FOR THE COMMUNITY to reduce the STATE IDENTIFIED priority consumption patterns.

Step 4. Implement evidence based prevention practices, policies and programs to address the STATE IDENTIFIED priority consumption patterns WITHIN THE COMMUNITY.

Step 5. Monitor, evaluate, sustain and improve evidence-based practices, policies or programs or replace those that fail WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

It is anticipated that there will be approximately 3-6 months of planning and preparation associated with Steps 1 & 2. A community strategic plan must then be submitted to SPF Project staff for review by a panel. Upon approval of the plan, communities will move to implementation of evidence-based programs, policies and practices appropriate to the

specific risk/protective factors or conditions within their community. Technical assistance will be provided to communities to perform each of these steps.

Approximately \$2,354,457 is available annually to fund up to 14 awards commencing January 1, 2006. The annual award amounts will range from \$140,000 to \$260,000, dependent upon the size of the community. The award period will be for three years. Any award resulting from this request will be subject to the state's General Conditions of Purchase, which is available from the Internet at www.purchasing.ri.gov, as well as the terms of this request.

SECTION III

VENDOR QUALIFICATIONS

Substance abuse prevention task forces funded under the Rhode Island Substance Abuse Prevention Act are eligible to apply for funding.

SECTION IV

LETTER OF INTEREST CONTENT/FORMAT

Interested individuals should submit Letters of Interest **NOT TO EXCEED 15 PAGES** in length, containing the following information:

1. Assessment

- a. *Description of consequences:* using the community profile provided, describe the consequences within your community that may be responsible for your community's contribution to the state burden associated with DSM IV diagnoses of alcohol or drug dependence or abuse.
- b. *Description of consumption patterns:* using the community profile provided, describe the consumption patterns within your community that may be responsible for your community's contribution to the state burden associated with DSM IV diagnoses of alcohol or drug dependence or abuse.
- c. *Identification of community level risk or protective factors:* using the community profile provided, please describe risk or protective factors/conditions within your community that contribute to the following state identified consumption patterns:
 1. Underage Drinking

2. Use of marijuana by youth in grades 9 -12
 3. Use of illicit substances by youth in grades 9 –12
- d. *Identify any additional data indicators*, not provided in the community profile, that you think may be helpful in determining why your community “ranks” so highly among the indicators in the community profile.
- e. *Capacity assessment*

Please describe the current ability of your coalition to address the risk or protective factors and consumption patterns described in Section 1b.

Applicants are encouraged to address the following:

1. Resource Scan/Resource Mapping - Describe all current substance abuse prevention initiatives occurring within your community. Be sure to include those sponsored, supported or funded by the task force in addition to those funded by external sources.
2. Describe how coordination/collaboration occurs within the community.
3. Describe how the membership of your coalition will be able to assist in reducing state priority consequences of DSM IV diagnoses of alcohol and drug dependence or abuse.

2. Capacity Building/Mobilization

Please describe a plan to address capacity needs identified through your assessment process as described in Section 1a-d.

3. Planning

Please describe the factors that you would consider in selecting strategies to address the risk or protective factors/conditions described above in section 1.b., given capacity issues addressed in 1.d.1-4.

For example, you determine the following about your community from the community profile:

Consequence indicators: there are high rates of narcotics violations compared to the communities of similar size

Consumption indicators: Youth grades 9 – 12 report 30 day use of illicit drugs in excess of the state average, your community is ranked within the top ten in the state

Risk factors: The majority of youth report that there is no or little harm in using illicit substances

Based upon this information, where might you want to intervene? What strategies might be helpful? Does your task force have any experience doing any of these things? Are there other entities within the community who do (especially if you don't)?

4. Budget

Please prepare an estimated three-year budget with the following assumptions: First 3-6 months will be devoted to assessment and planning in the community. The remaining period will be devoted to implementation of plan including delivering evidence-based policies, practices and programs across the individual/peer, family and community domains.

 5. "Local" Evaluation (10% of direct cost budget)
 6. Support of Training and Technical Assistance Resource Center at \$15,500 annually

 1. Same personnel as described above, but Program Manager will be F/T
 2. Materials
 3. Contractual (at least \$75,000) to support delivery of curriculum/programming in two domains
 4. "Local" Evaluation (10% of direct cost budget)
 5. Support of Training and Technical Assistance Resource Center at \$15,500 annually

Responses will be evaluated using the following criteria:

Assessment (0-50 points) description of over all community conditions, risk or protective factors/conditions within the community related to consumption patterns, identification of additional data indicators.

Capacity Building (0-20 points) a description of how capacity needs identified in the assessment phase would be addressed.

Planning (0-20 points) a description of the factors that would be considered in selecting strategies to address the risk or protective factors/conditions described in section 1.b., given capacity issues addressed in 1.d.1-4.

Budget (0-5 points) an estimated 3-year budget incorporating assumptions as described.

Appendices (0-5 points) mission statement, list of coalition membership
