

Education course. RIC has nearly 100 Gen. Ed. courses for you to choose from this summer.





Sociology 262: *Sociology of Money and Economic Exchange* includes practical perspectives, values, problems, and a review of monetary institutions.

IS THERE A DOCTOR IN THE (SCHOOL)HOUSE?

Two hybrid workshops developed for the RIC/URI Ph.D. in education program will be available this summer for school administrators. *Identities, Discourses, and Literacy Practices*, offered session I, will situate some of the theoretical issues and qualitative methodologies that have been studied and apply them to individual contexts. *Survey Design*, offered across sessions I and II, is an introduction to literature and practice related to the design, testing, and evaluation of survey questionnaires.



FRIGHT SUMMER READING ANYONE?

Topics in Cultural Studies: The Frankenstein Culture Text will be offered in (what else?) hybrid format. In the nearly two centuries since *Frankenstein's* first publication, it has inspired scores of stories, novels, films, and television programs as well as hundreds of critical articles. This course will examine some of these progeny of the book Mary Shelley described as “my hideous progeny,” along with *Frankenstein* itself.

EVERY TEACHER NEEDS SYSTEMIC FUNCTIONAL LINGUISTICS

Session I's *Teaching the Language of School* is designed for reading specialists, English educators, and ESL and bilingual teachers. This course is also open to any classroom teacher who is concerned with teaching school-valued genres to support student success. When students understand how English works, all can produce oral and spoken language that meets or exceeds standards. Systemic Functional Linguistics is a state-of-the-art approach that teachers can use to unpack academic language and advance students' proficiency in the language of school.
